WE HAVE HAD A SPOOFING ATTACK ON A COUPLE OF OUR DOMAIN EMAIL ADDRESSES!

What does this mean and how did it affect us? (By Lindsay Threadgate as I understand it) Email spoofing is when an attacker uses a fake email address with the domain of a legitimate website (in our case the domain is newcastleprobus.org). It is a scam or phishing email which looks like it came from a legitimate sender.

The goal is to trick a recipient into; visiting a website where malware will be downloaded, or opening an attachment with malware, or entering credentials that will transfer money to an account that the attacker controls.

In our case it seems that the download of malware was the intent but not our members. The attack was using our domain email as a conduit for bulk emails to people who reside in Ukraine. These emails apparently had a link to a malicious website. We had one contact from a recipient complaining "We've got spam e-mail with infected file attached". The country code was Ukraine.

The effect on us was really only nuisance and annoyance as the bulk emails exceeded the permissible number per hour and error messages filled our inboxes to capacity. At this point alert emails were sent to me and Peter Rickford.

This is apparently a very difficult problem to resolve. The technology use in our case is quite old and the only solution found was to delete the email addresses affected. This has been done, and the problem is resolved at least for now.

The affected email addresses were for the Newsletter and Activities, and it is hoped that the deletion of these addresses will not be a problem.

I was aware of this type of attack but do not pretend to understand it at all well. The bottom line is that if you receive an email that appears to be from someone you know or think reputable, but the content is unusual of asks you to click on a link then **DON'T**.

Members Care

The committee is not always informed when a member becomes ill or passes away. So, if you become aware of another member having a serious illness, accident or passing away, inform the secretary or a committee member. The secretary will take any action appropriate.

Lindsay's Email Tip:

"If you cannot find an email that you should have received then LOOK IN THE JUNK or SPAM FOLDER"

"Spam" and "junk" email are often used interchangeably to describe unwanted messages, but they can have slightly different connotations. Spam generally refers to unsolicited bulk emails, often sent with malicious intent like phishing or malware distribution. Junk email, while also unwanted, might include a wider range of materials, including physical email, and can encompass less malicious, but still unwanted, advertising.

In essence: Spam is a subset of junk email that is specifically associated with malicious or harmful activities. Junk email is a broader term that encompasses all unwanted mail, including spam.

The filters employed to place incoming email in the Junk or Spam folders sometimes pick up legitimate email, including bulk emails such as newsletters.

If you are looking for an expected email then it is a good idea to try a "search" (the search box is normally at the top of the page, it might have "search" or a little magnifying glass symbol and there might be options). Just enter a few key works and if it is there it will be shown. Best to click on the "Junk" or "Spam" folder first. This might be at the top or bottom of the list of folders.

Be aware of the 30-day rule: Junk or Spam is automatically deleted after 30 days. It goes to the Bin or Deleted Items folder where it is automatically deleted after 30 days.

Once you have found that elusive email and opened it there will be an option to mark it as "Not Junk" or "Not Spam" or some similar wording that will avoid future emails from that source being filtered. There is a lot more, but I think this is enough for now.
